Within seconds, it can lower its leaves and make its tiny leaflets close up like folding chairs. This movement is hought to be initiated by electrical impulses remarkably similar to nerve signals in animals. But without the nimals' sophisticated motion machinery, the mimosa has had to be creative in devising a way to move. For motion, the plant depends on tiny, bulb-shaped organs located at the base of each leaf stalk and leaflet. Called pulvini, these organs hold the plant parts in place. This function we may call "intuition," and it operates in our everyday life and all the time, although we not be aware of it. We are wise if we take heed of its voice. For when we cannot make a decision about ething, such as accepting a job, what to do in a domestic crisis, or buying a house, we commonly say, "Let us on it!"
