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Question 2 (50%)

The following excerpt is taken from the book of Job in the Hebrew Bible. Please read the first two chapters carefully and give a critical analysis of it.

There was once a man in the land I of Uz whose name was Job. That man was blameless and upright, one man was blameless and upright, one who feared God and turned away from evil. ²There were born to him seven sons and three daughters. ³He had seven thousand sheep, three thousand camels, five hundred yoke of oxen, five hundred donkeys, and very many servants; so that this man was the greatest of all the people of the east. ⁴His sons used to go and hold feasts in one another's houses in turn; and they would send and invite their three sis-ters to eat and drink with them. ⁵And ters to eat and drink with them. 5 And when the feast days had run them. ⁵And when the feast days had run their course, Job would send and sanctify them, and he would rise early in the morning and offer burnt offerings ac-cording to the number of them all; for Job said, "It may be that my children have sinned, and cursed God in their hearts." Note: The word "Satan" in the text does not designate "Me Devil" of later Christian theology. It's meaning is "adversary," "accuser." It serves as God's advocate, probing human behavior according to God's directives in soarch of truth and faithfulness.
