A mountain of garbage looks awful. And it is worse than it looks – and smells. Those tons of decomposing trash are producing methane gas. If allowed to seep out into the environment, methane contributes significantly to global warming. Yet it is not all bad. If captured correctly, methane can generate electricity.

The Environmental Protection Agency says about 400 landfills in the United States have methane power plants. One of them is the Frey Farm Landfill, run by a local government authority in Lancaster County, Pennsylvania. The E.P.A. considers it a model landfill for the way it pipes methane to a private plant that generates enough electricity for about 4,000 homes.

Gary Platt is the plant's operator. "They bring the garbage in and after the garbage is compacted into the landfill, we draw wells," he explains. "Wells go down, we put perforated pipe down the center of it, which collects all the methane from the garbage."

The gas plant also produces steam that a local dairy uses to pasteurize its milk and clean its equipment. The dairy's executive vice president, John Cox, points to the old diesel-fueled boilers the dairy used to use. "We estimate that we're going to save 220,000 gallons [833,000 liters] of diesel fuel a year, by purchasing steam from this methodology."

The largest study of a tiger population has yielded a rare bit of good news for the highly endangered cats. Researchers working in Nagarahole reserve in southern India, where tigers are relatively safe from poachers, set out camera traps for nine years. They were able to track 74 individual tigers (identified by their stripes.) Intriguingly, the overall tiger population grew by 3 percent a year, despite the fact that 23 percent of the tigers died or left the reserve each year. The reason for the growth? Fecundity. Nagarahole's abundance of deer and other ungulates apparently enabled the tigers to breed more readily than expected. Prey is "a key pillar" in tiger conservation, says Ullas Karanth of the Wildlife Conservation Society in Bangalore.

Questions 33-36

Venus, Earth, and Mars, although comparably endowed with carbon and water, evolved differently from one another owing to size and distance from the Sun.

Venus, closest to the Sun, receives the most solar energy. Early in its history, when the Sun shone less brightly than now, it may have had oceans, which would have boiled off as the Sun's output increased. Meanwhile, volcanoes were venting carbon dioxide into the atmosphere. Venus laced the water to return carbon to the crust as carbonate rock, and carbon dioxide levels rose unchecked. This created a "greenhouse," allowing solar energy to penetrate the atmosphere but blocking the escape of heat. Temperatures on Venus are now too hot to support even primitive life.

Earth, about the same size as Venus, is far enough from the Sun to retain water. It recycles its carbon through plate tectonics (changes in the structure of its crust). The prolonged presence of water enabled marine organisms to evolve, and they now serve as a means of removing carbon dioxide from the atmosphere. Thus in equilibrium, Earth's climate is moderate.

Mars, too, probably once had a moderate climate and liquid surface water, but it is smaller than Earth and Venus, and tectonically less active. The result: carbon dioxide was removed from the atmosphere but not returned to it. Thus the "greenhouse" weakened, water froze, and Mars was left high and dry.
